

## WHERE DOES THE TRASH COME FROM?

- Careless debris that has been left behind by waterway users
- Deliberate debris that is deliberately dumped
- $\blacksquare$  Accidental debris that blows out of vehicles on the road and ends up in the water

## WHY IS DEBRIS SO BAD FOR THE WATER?

- Damage debris blows into the water, sinks to the bottom and snuffs out any chance at aquatic plant growth, which is the foundation for a thriving ecosystem
- Expensive debris clogs up the storm drains and retaining ponds, creates muck in the water and requires additional manpower to cleanup
- Eye Sore debris is unattractive which affects business, tourism and the economy
